### Didn't See That Coming!

When 2020 began, none of us would have predicted by mid-March our normal lives would be so incredibly altered – by a pandemic, of all things. Who would have thought that the Christmas song "There's No Place Like Home for the Holidays" would be taken so literally or apply to every other day, too?!!! Some of you have your own personal stories of the unexpected happening, whether related to COVID or not. Some of you lost loved ones unexpectedly. Some of you had challenges in a relationship. Your finances could have taken a hit. The unexpected wasn't all bad, of course. Some of you had good news you didn't anticipate – a new job, a better outlook, a word of acceptance from a college or program, improved finances, a new relationship, etc.

The history of God's people is worth remembering in times like these because their story is not just about what they encountered that was unforeseen. It was (and is) also a story of what God is up to all the time: loving people and bringing new life out of death. The story of the people of God includes God finding ways to bring people out of captivity (personal or corporate.) Forgiving people whom others had written off. Inspiring people who felt they couldn't lead.

A plot twist in a book or a movie or a great trick by a magician can be entertaining, but plot twists in our lives have consequences that matter. Having someone who is for us to come alongside us through all those twists is comforting and helpful. The Bible and our own faith journey invite us to anticipate God being active on our behalf even when we do not anticipate it.

By the end of 2021, we will have seen more examples of "didn't see that coming!" Who knows what those may be? (We can hope for a more normal year!) As we get ready to start 2021 though, let's keep looking for God to act all along the way with love. May we trust that whatever those out of the blue experiences will be, we also will have inspiring experiences and insights to point to of where God also popped up to be there with us. Anticipate that coming for sure!

### Details for How We Worship

#### FOR EVERYONE COMING TO PEACE

- \*Whether you drive-in or worship at home, we have a modified communion option. You can take a piece of bread or cracker with you to the service. We will give the Words of Institution on behalf of all of us and invite us to take our bread/cracker at the same time and partake of this modified version of the Lord's Supper. When the back-order is filled, we will also be adding a prepackaged wafer & grape juice option.
- \* In order to keep people's safety in mind following the advice of the CDC and Illinois Department of Public Health, there will be a drop box if you wish to bring an offering with you. Otherwise, we will depend on people continuing to contribute online or by mail.
- \* Bathrooms will be available, but people would be encouraged to use them only if necessary, and social distancing would be required. The doors to the bathrooms will be left open to eliminate having to touch them, and for the sake of knowing what kind of distancing/waiting is needed. Masks are required.

## <u>DRIVE-IN WORSHIP ON SATURDAYS AT 5:00PM</u> & SUNDAYS AT 9:30AM

- \* Households are required to socially distance from each other, which can be accomplished by **parking on the yellow lines. Our worship location is centered under the main canopy.**
- \* Masks would be required if you get out of your car. (We have spare masks.)
- \* We will have sound projection/speakers for all to hear, plus the new FM channel (88.3).
- \* The worship will last about 30 to 40 minutes. Worshiping outdoors allows us to sing!

## ONLINE OPTION CONTINUES INCLUDING AN 8:30 VERSION

\* We will continue to live-stream our worship. We plan each week to record both Saturday and Sunday. Assuming everything works, all will be available through our Facebook site. We are now going to live-stream an inside the sanctuary version at 8:30am for those for whom that option would be meaningful.

We are going to feature stories about people from Peace from time to time.

Enjoy this one from Vivian & Jack Farbak!

"There was a time when we felt totally abandoned; where we didn't want to be around other people; where they had 'happy things to talk about' and we couldn't stand it." The challenge of believing that God had totally let us down was not based on a sudden whim. It was based on watching our 30 year-old daughter dying of cancer. She fought hard and we prayed hard and we watched her go from a vibrant mother and active person to a shell of herself, losing 65 pounds in that awful 18-month battle. A faith relationship with God after that seemed phony and inauthentic and was replaced by bitterness. We couldn't sing and we couldn't pray....and we didn't want to if that's who God was.

We hadn't always felt that way. Jack grew up at Zion Lutheran at 109<sup>th</sup> and S. Park in Chicago – Sunday School, confirmation, grammar school, the works. Vivian belonged to Bethany Reformed church, with Sunday School and weekly Bible classes from 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grades. When we got married (in Bethany) we both were a part of Zion, and then other churches in Calumet City and Thornton. We appreciated how people in our churches tried to support us in the battle with cancer, even the church where our granddaughter was going to pre-school. But the bottom line was that our daughter, Donna, died, and we were angry. And we had had it.

It turned out, of course, that God hadn't abandoned us, nor was God going to stop trying to crack through that bitterness and anger, which it turns out was only making us unhappy. Our son, Jack, and his wonderful family were a part of Peace. They asked us on occasion to come with them, but we said, "no," just as often. Then one time – maybe it was Mother's Day - we said okay. And something happened to us. The peace that had eluded us began to seem like a possibility. We started very slowly, not being sure we dared to venture back to a faith relationship. But we did keep coming. And sure enough, that peace that passes all understanding became real for us. The bitterness and anger were replaced by healing and hope. We now know that God brings life out of death. We know that when we pass away, we'll be in heaven with our daughter – all healed! And along the way now, when Vivian had cancer or Jack had a heart attack, we had a strength, a peace, that we turned to that was outside ourselves.

We are so grateful that our faith journey came full circle. We don't have to pretend the pain of losing our daughter isn't real. It still hurts. But we have a perspective now that makes us want more and more of that peace of God. We can sing again and go to Bible Study and Sunday classes, knowing first-hand of God's love.

### Because of You and Your Gifts

Lilian and her son, Nevil, live in one of the world's largest slums in Nairobi, Kenya. It's common for the buildings in this slum not to have running water or electricity. Paying for water that's safe to drink is the most expensive item for families like Lilian's. Often, the choice is between having clean water to drink or food to eat. Can you imagine making this heartbreaking choice? And through your generous giving, your neighbors like Lilian and Nevil will have easy access to clean drinking water, clean bathrooms and safe places to wash their hands. You also help provide health care to prevent and treat deadly diseases, including COVID-19.

## Helping Santa Cruz's Food Pantry

We have an ongoing partnership with Santa Cruz Lutheran Church in Joliet. They have a food and resource pantry for people of their neighborhood who are hungry or in need. You can bring donations anytime and put them in the baskets on the floor heading into Fellowship Hall. The pantry needs the following specific items: **especially cereal (all kinds), canned fruit, peanut butter, soups,** coffee (ground), creamers (powdered), hand soap (bar & liquid), disposable diapers, dish soap, toothpaste, juices.
