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Sooner or Later

For the most part, some of us seem to skate through life on a very smooth path. We have some disappointments, but overall, the way is relatively easy. We can imagine what someone else's excruciating physical pain may be like, but we understand that a bad headache that goes away with a little acetaminophen doesn't measure up. The loss of a beloved family pet can make us very sad, but can we really even begin to enter into the sadness of a mother who loses her innocent child to gang violence?

There are some who think that sooner or later we'll all experience the really bad side of life. Maybe in some ways they are right; sooner or later we are all going to experience loss and death. But many of us who are so fortunate as to live in the United States who can go to great schools and find food and shelter and all the extras you could ever ask for just minutes away, many of us are going to keep right on skating through to the ending of our lives in relative peace and security. The people in our own country and around the world who struggle may enter our field of vision at moments, but it is not personal.

So, even for us, can there be some "sooner or later" moments? I hope so. It definitely was something Jesus invited his disciples and followers, and even his adversaries, to consider. There is more to life than external circumstances whether easy or difficult. Sooner or later, for example, Jesus would help us realize that all our privileges and advantages can't make up for an emptiness in our very being. Sooner or later, may it catch up to us when we are faced with evil and injustice in the world, including inside us, that it doesn't go away by looking the other way. Sooner or later, may we hear our hearts calling us to a different standard, to a way of living that is less about self and more about giving. Sooner or later, may the call of God speak directly to the question of "who am I and why am I here?" And when those kinds of moments, or even one of those things happens, the ending does not need to be sad or bad or include physical pain. The ending can be lifegiving; life-reorienting; life-eternal even!

May this season of Lent invite us often, not just sooner or later, to look and listen for God's call!

Details for How We Worship

FOR EVERYONE COMING TO PEACE

*Whether you drive-in, are in person or worship at home, we have a modified communion option. You can take a piece of bread or cracker with you to the service. We will give the Words of Institution on behalf of all of us and invite us to take our bread/cracker at the same time and partake of this modified version of the Lord's Supper. At the 8:30 worship, a pre-packaged grape juice & wafer will be available.

* In order to keep people's safety in mind following the advice of the CDC and Illinois Department of Public Health, there will be a drop box if you wish to bring an offering with you. Otherwise, we will depend on people continuing to contribute online or by mail.

* Bathrooms will be available, but people would be encouraged to use them only if necessary, and social distancing would be required. The doors to the bathrooms will be left open to eliminate having to touch them, and for the sake of knowing what kind of distancing/waiting is needed. Masks are required.

DRIVE-IN WORSHIP ON SATURDAYS AT 5:00PM & SUNDAYS AT 9:30AM

* Households are required to socially distance from each other, which can be accomplished by **parking on the yellow lines. Our worship location is centered under the main canopy.**

* Masks would be required if you get out of your car. (We have spare masks.)

* We will have sound projection/speakers for all to hear, plus the FM channel (88.3.)

* The worship will last about 30 to 40 minutes. Worshiping outdoors allows us to sing!

ONLINE OPTIONS CONTINUE INCLUDING AN 8:30 VERSION

* We will continue to live-stream our worship services. We plan each week to record both Saturday and Sunday. Assuming everything works, all will be available through our Facebook site. We also have an only-livestream inside the sanctuary version at 8:30am for those for whom that option is meaningful.

INDOOR WORSHIP RESUMES only at 8:30am Sundays

Here are the notes if you are planning to come (registrations required)

* **Masks will be required** from the time you leave your car until you get back in the car. If you forget yours, we will have spares. (Those who are less than 2 years old or those with special health issues are exempt.)

* Enter and exit through the Fellowship Hall door

* Temperatures will be taken and names will be checked off both to match the sign-up list, as well as if we needed to do contact tracing. You may have to wait a little bit, with spacing between households. Come early, please.

* There will be no congregational singing of a hymn, except by one worship leader who will be shielded from the congregation. You *can* hum along!

* We will have pews marked off so that socially distanced spaces can be maintained. Of course, household units can stay together in their pew. Ushers will be available to help guide people, filling in pews from the front of the sanctuary to the back, and at the end of service leaving from the back.

* We won't be having nursery attendants, acolytes, refreshments, lay liturgists, lesson readers, etc.

* Between services, the sanctuary and all other spaces will be electrostatically sprayed with a disinfectant that will cover all surfaces.

* Bathrooms will be discouraged from being used but will also receive attention.

* Drinking fountains will not be in use.

* Communion will have options: continue to be "bring your own bread or cracker," or take one of the wafers (gluten free or regular) or take one of the pre-packaged kind.

* The service length will continue to be between 30 and 40 minutes.

* If you feel sick or have come in contact with someone who has COVID-19, please stay home and watch via the live-stream.

* We are going to need volunteer ushers, temperature takers, and after worship sprayers. You can sign up on the website (Sign Up) or contact the office. These volunteers will need to provide a N95/KN95 mask for themselves. There will be no physical contact with anyone, but the temperature takers will be within the sixfoot space for a few seconds.

Please pray for our world's healing, and for our congregation's ongoing attempts to stay faithful to God and God's leading!

I always wanted to become a teacher, but when life took me in other directions, I just figured, "Well, I guess that wasn't God's will for my life. Hmmm. And here I had been so sure..." And I went on with my life as it was.

And yet, like a drifting boat tied to an anchor, I kept getting tugged back to the idea of teaching. Waves of fear of all the obstacles I would face kept pushing me away from the idea. But I knew that if this was God's path for me, and if I did my part by doing my best, He would go with me and make a way for me to go over, around, or through each rough patch. So, I took a leap of faith and said yes to His call, finished college, and became a teacher.

Over the years, God kept His promise and carried me past those rough patches in the road. For example, at those times when I felt frozen with fear of failure, recalling that my goal was to serve God rather than to self-promote took the pressure off. It meant I didn't have to concern myself with material gain, admiration, power, authority, or winning the competition. Or even being in a competition. What a relief!! I could just relax inside, do my best, and let God do the rest.

Those times when I believed I had gone as far as I could go on my own strength, I knew God would help me to go the distance or cover it Himself. There were mornings when I felt any combination of too tired or sad or anxious or unprepared to face the day's demands – from paperwork to administrative directives, to supervisor assessments & coworker interactions, parent concerns and needy students. Those days when I felt depleted were the times I most felt the fullness of God's presence. I would simply pray, "God, I am trying to do what you asked, but if you want this done, you are going to have to help me. I have done what I can, and you will have to take it from here."

As long as I continued to do my best, God always got me past the steep cliffs and dark valleys along the way.

I'm retired from teaching now, but I still listen for God's guidance. I know that when I have gone as far as I am able on this path, God will take me the rest of the way home.

QPR stands for Question, Persuade, Refer and is the CPR of mental health. This 1 ½ hour class increases public awareness of suicide and improves one's ability to identify and refer those at risk for suicide. Participants are equipped to intervene early by learning how to question, persuade and refer persons who are at risk for suicide.
